## Rewarding & Recognising achievement in the field of natural history

The British Naturalists' Association founded in 1905 is the national body for naturalists promoting the study of natural history in Britain.

The BNA is aware that the high standards of those who study natural history and gain field skills were not given proper recognition.

To this end the Association instituted graded membership on a three tier basis in order to formally award and recognise specific levels of knowledge and achievement in natural history. Members are encouraged to share their knowledge and through its grading scheme, recognises the gaining of relevant field skills and expertise. This stimulates naturalists to further develop their own individual knowledge and demonstrates to others you believe in furthering the study of natural history.

MBNA those naturalists that have established an expertise in the practice and understanding of natural history, and have become skilled in identification and other field skills. Becoming a Registered Member carries with it a status of being a proven field naturalist; it is an acknowledgement of gaining a high standard of competence in natural history.

**FBNA** gives recognition of significant expertise and standing in natural history. The holding of an academic degree or doctorate in relevant subjects and

publications showing significant appropriate involvement for this level plus evidence of exceptional field experience can lead to Fellowship.

## The Encaenia



The Encaenia, with its robed procession is when the achievements in developing field and other natural history skills are visually rewarded with the appropriate symbolism of gaining entitlement to official dress. Recognition conveys the right to use the post-nominative letters FBNA, MBNA or ABNA and to wear the grades robes on appropriate occasions.

### Fellowship (Honoris Causa) Of the British Naturalists' Association

To promote due recognition of excellence in and study of natural history, the Trustees established a Fellowship Honoris Causa which is bestowed on a strictly limited number of eminent naturalists of outstanding calibre.
