Membership Grade Notes

The British Naturalists' Association, founded in 1905, is the national body for naturalists promoting the study of natural history in Britain. The Association encourages members to share their knowledge and, through its grading scheme, recognises the gaining of relevant skills and expertise.

Ordinary members whose skills and expertise meet the required criteria may apply to become a **Registered Associate**, **Registered Member** or **Fellow** of the BNA.

A successful registration will entitle the member to use the appropriate post nominative initials and the entitlements detailed below.

- HonFBNA Fellow of The British Naturalists' Association (Honoris Causa).
- FBNA Fellow of The British Naturalists' Association.
- MBNA Registered Member of The British Naturalists' Association.
- ABNA Associate Member of The British Naturalists' Association.

Honoris Causa Hon FBNA

To promote due recognition of excellence in natural history, the Fellowship (*Honoris Causa*) is bestowed upon a naturalist of outstanding calibre. It is presented infrequently to eminent naturalists who meet this same standard of criteria and is strictly limited to a small number. The formation of this Fellowship is in accordance with the aims of the Association to promote the study of natural history.

The Peter Scott Memorial Award is the BNA's highest award and is presented to a naturalist who has made an outstanding international contribution to our understanding of natural history. Recipients of the Peter Scott Memorial Award are granted Honorary Fellowship (Honoris Causa).

Hon FBNA robes are a master's gown of dark green edged with pale green and gold, the hood is dark green with gold edging. The headwear is a black cloth bonnet with gold tassel.

Fellow of the British Naturalists' Association FBNA

The holding of academic standing (doctorate, and/or degree in relevant subjects) and relevant publications showing significant appropriate involvement for this level of membership, plus evidence of significant field experience, can lead to Fellowship being conferred by the Association.

Also, a very significant contribution in the practise of natural history in field work can also lead to recognition as a Fellow.





FBNA Robes

Fellow of The British Naturalists' Association are entitled to use the post nominative letters **FBNA**.

The Fellowship robes are a master's black gown, and a simple hood in the colours of the Fellowship - dark green and pale green lining with silver edging to the hood. The headwear shall be a black cloth bonnet with dark green tassel.

These entitlements are retained for as long as their name remains on the Register of Registered Fellows.

The David Bellamy Award is an annual award given to a field naturalist of distinction, and is automatically entitled to become FBNA.

Registered Member of The British Naturalists' Association MBNA

Those naturalists that have established an expertise in the practise and understanding of natural history, and have become skilled and experienced in identification and other field skills, may be considered for full Membership recognition.

Becoming a Registered Member carries with it the status of being a proven field naturalist; it is an acknowledgement of gaining a high standard of competence in natural history.

Registered membership can be gained after two years membership of BNA, a field club or similar organisation, with evidence of continuing field work and an appropriate level of skill and expertise plus either:

- the publication of at least 2 natural history papers or 10 natural history articles
- led at least 10 field walks for BNA or field clubs
- obtained a degree in relevant natural sciences
- developed a high level of skills in identification and recording
- substantial experience of presenting natural history in the media
- some other comparable and acceptable evidence of a good standard of competence as a natural historian



MBNA Robes

Registered Member of the British Naturalists' Association are entitled to use the post nominative letters MBNA.

The Membership robes, are a bachelor's black gown with a simple hood of dark green and pale green lining. Headwear is a simple mortar square.

These entitlements are retained for as long as their name remains on the Register of Registered Members.

The Richard Fitter Memorial medal is awarded to an MBNA who is a dedicated field naturalist working to a high standard.

Associate Member of The British Naturalists' Association ABNA

Ordinary Members over 18 years of age can apply for recognition as an Associate and to use the post nominative letters **ABNA** after they have been an Ordinary Member for one year and can show evidence that they have attended natural history lectures and taken part in active field work. Existing members (prior to 31st December 2006) have an automatic entitlement to apply for ABNA without the need of further evidence.

Associate Members are entitled to wear the Associate's robes, of an appropriate black gown.

The Roger Tabor Award is presented annually to an ABNA of a high standard.
